



Wilsonville's Pat Duke Named Librarian of the Year Long-time Library Director Lauded for Advocacy of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library



Pat Duke, Director of the Wilsonville Public Library, is the Oregon Library Association's 2018 Librarian of the Year. OLA presents the award annually to an Oregon librarian for exceptional service.

Duke's honor was announced at OLA's annual conference in Eugene in April. Among those in attendance were colleagues from Oregon libraries, the City of Wilsonville and the Wilsonville Library Foundation, who are happy to see Duke's accomplishments recognized throughout Oregon.

"Thanks to Pat's vision, leadership, and staff empowerment, the Wilsonville Library plays a central role in educating and entertaining the people of

Wilsonville," said City Manager Bryan Cosgrove. "The entire community benefits from innovative programs developed by Pat, his creative staff, the Wilsonville Library Foundation, our Board and the many hard-working volunteers whose contributions make our library successful."

The Association cites Duke's contributions to libraries and readers, including outstanding work in Clackamas County to support the formation of the Clackamas County Library District.

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Teen's Scout Project Gives Residents a Proper Way to Retire Flags

Jacob Storm was motivated. The Wilsonville teen had finally zeroed in on the perfect Eagle Scout service project.

"I had been looking for ideas for a few months when I got the idea from a scout master in my troop to make an American flag collection box," said Storm, 18, now a senior at Wilsonville High School. "Since we collect American flags to be retired on Flag Day, this would give us a way to collect more."

Storm's enthusiasm wavered when he began searching for a box.

"I learned that the U.S. Postal Service is not supposed to sell boxes to the public, and that similar ones cost close to \$1,000," Storm said, "so for a few months all I did was plan my next steps. I couldn't get a box to start my project moving."

His luck took a happy turn when David Penaflor, a military veteran, showed up at City Hall last June asking if he could place a flag disposal box in Wilsonville.

"When I went to the city with this idea, they said 'wow, we like the idea, but someone's already thought of it,'" Penaflor said.

A City employee who spoke to Penaflor, the late Jon Gail, was a Storm family friend. Gail knew about the teen's project, and put the two in touch.

"I was touched by this young man wanting to do a project like this, honoring our worn American flags to be disposed of properly. I wanted to meet him," Penaflor said.

A retired letter carrier, Penaflor had the one thing

Storm was missing — an out-of-service mailbox.

The two met. Penaflor was so impressed with the teen's planning, that he agreed to part with the box and let Storm run with his project.

"It's not easy and it takes some coordination," said

Penaflor, who previously made a flag collection box for American Legion Post 158 in Tigard. "Jacob really sold me. He gave me a good plan."

Storm cleaned out the box and organized a Scout work session, at which troop members brainstormed designs.

"I selected the best parts of each design and made a model in the computer for the logos, paint colors and lettering," Storm said. "Jeff Lewis Auto-body in Keizer donated time and materials to get the box sandblasted and painted."

Storm hired a company that specializes in vinyl car logos to fabricate letters and logos and place them on the box.

In January, Storm and members of his Boy Scout troop installed the box outside the Park & Recreation building, near the Korean War Memorial.

"Anyone can come by now, whenever they want, and donate a flag at their leisure," Storm said. "There have been quite a few donated."

Storm earned his Eagle Scout badge, and a nice letter of support from Penaflor along the way.

"I am very proud of Jacob," Penaflor wrote. "Everyone who comes to the Korean War Memorial will see his great work for a patriotic cause honoring our worn American flags."

Wilsonville Festival of Arts Returns for 19th Year

The Wilsonville Festival of Arts returns to Town Center Park on June 2-3, eager to provide an enriching community event that appeals to a broad audience of art enthusiasts and festivalgoers.

The festival includes interactive art installations that provide opportunities for guests to engage or participate in the artistic creation. One such exhibit pairs local artist Palmarin Merges and students from Art & Technology High School.

A collaboration with Portland's Northwest Film Center, Micro Movie Theatre, showcases 20 short films — most five minutes or less — produced by Pacific Northwest filmmakers within the past year. The exhibit includes animated films, documentaries, abstract films and fiction.

Several Oregon Book Award winners and finalists are attending Art of the Word, a showcase that

includes readings from Joe Wilkins, Danielle Cadena Deulen and Omar El Akkad.

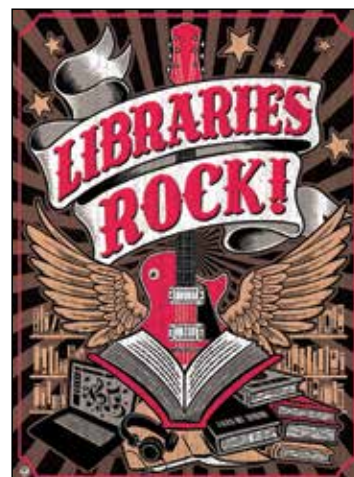

SMART Transit Seeks Public Input to Guide New Initiatives

New state funding sources are creating an opportunity for Wilsonville's South Metro Area Regional Transit (SMART), to pursue additional and/or enhanced public transportation services.

Throughout June, SMART is seeking input from community stakeholders to help the agency prioritize future initiatives being considered, including:

- Adding new destinations such as Woodburn, Hillsboro, Oregon City and/or downtown Portland
- Eliminating fares on out-of-town destinations
- Converting bus fleet to alternative fuels — electric and CNG
- Developing new SMART programs (vanpool, bikeshare, coordinated medical shuttles)
- Increasing current weekday service hours
- Increasing current weekend service hours
- Increasing frequency of current bus routes (i.e. less wait time between buses)

Visit www.ridesmart.com/surveyTMPupdate and complete a very brief survey by June 30 to help guide SMART's priorities.

Community input will be analyzed and incorporated into the Transit Programs Enhancement Strategy, an amendment to the 2017 Transit Master Plan that guides SMART planning and decision-making, and satisfies an eligibility requirement for funding.

Preliminary survey results and project details are being presented to the Planning Commission at a work session on June 13, 6 pm, at City Hall.

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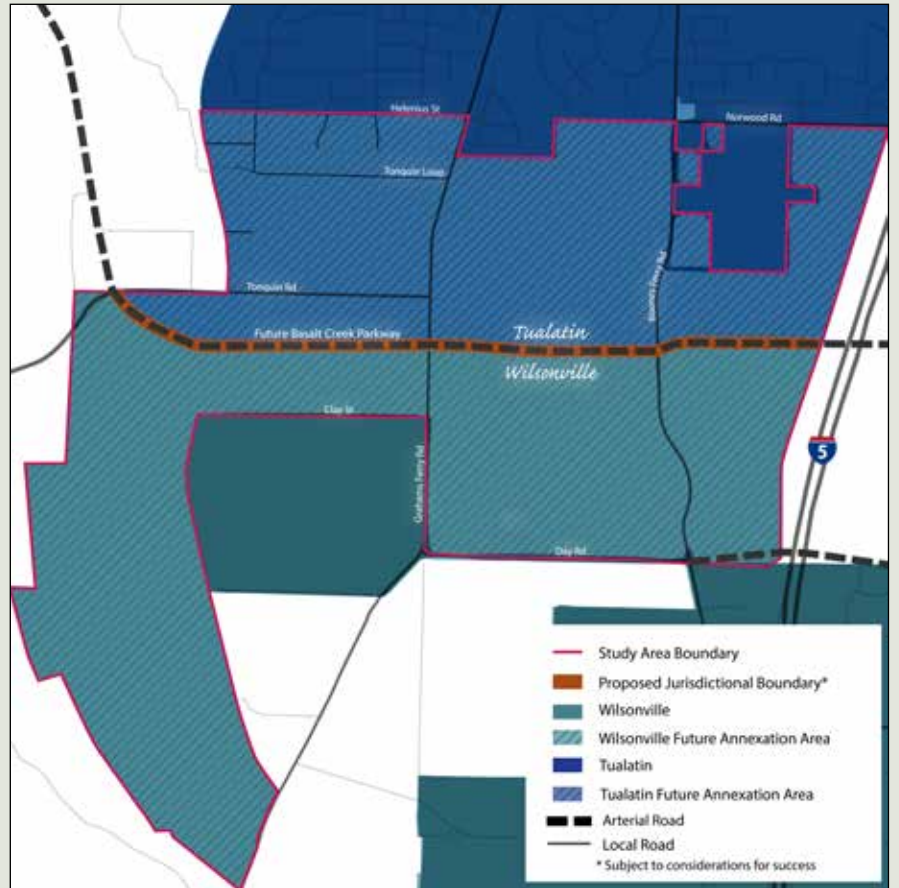
Wilsonville, Tualatin Resume Development of Vision for Basalt Creek Area

Tualatin and Wilsonville are a step closer to developing the Basalt Creek Concept Plan, which provides a vision for about 850 acres — generally located between the two cities — that is currently comprised of homes, rural industry, such as nurseries and farms, and beautiful natural areas.

Portland's regional government authority, Metro, recently approved the land-use designation for Basalt Creek's Central Subarea, determining that the subarea acreage remain designated for employment use. With a resolution in place, a project team from both cities is now developing the final draft concept plan.

The collaborative effort ensures that both cities are involved in creating a vision that appeals to members of both communities, provides adequate services, coordinates land use and transportation, and preserves the area's natural resources.

The planning team is seeking adoption of the concept plan by both city councils this August. In Wilsonville, the Planning Commission is reviewing the Basalt Creek Concept Plan at a work session on June 13, 6 pm, at City Hall. A City Council work session is scheduled for June 18, 5 pm, at City Hall.



Adoption hearings are scheduled for July 11 with the Planning Commission and August 6 with City Council.

City Crews to Flush Water Mains; Rust-Colored Water May Appear

Wilsonville utility crews flush the City's water mains annually to scour out mineral deposits. This process ensures optimal water quality and helps to maintain the infrastructure by exercising hydrants, valves and blow-off assemblies.



The City's 2018 schedule for water main flushing:
Zone 1 (orange), June 4-19;
Zone 2 (green), June 20-25;
Zone 3 (purple), June 26-29.

Water flushed out of fire hydrants often appears to be orange or rust-colored. The discoloration, caused by iron deposits, is a normal occurrence. When the water moving through the main pipe and out the hydrant begins to run clear, it signals the crew to continue flushing at the next downstream location.

When flushing occurs, you may notice discolored water inside your home. Don't worry. This water has

been fully disinfected and poses no public health risk.

If you observe discolored water, simply do the following:

- Run your cold water fixtures for several minutes.
- Flush your toilets multiple times.

Water should run clear within a few minutes.

As long as discoloration persists, avoid washing whites; discolored water may cause items to stain. Continue running cold water until the discoloration has cleared before washing light-colored laundry.

If you observe crews flushing in your area, please share the roadway to give them room to work safely. If you have any questions or concerns regarding the City's annual water main flushing, please call the Public Works Department, 503-570-4092.

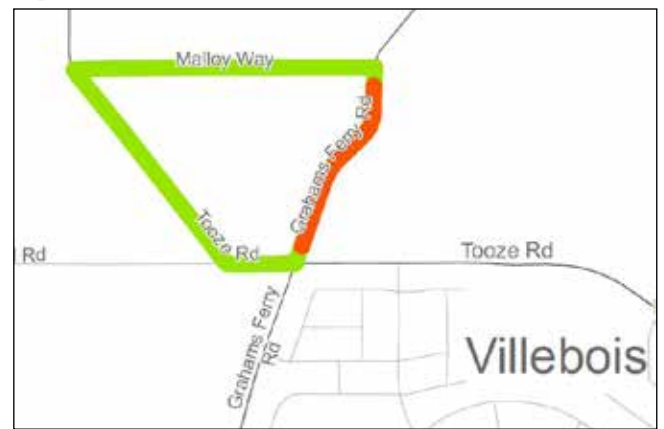
June Construction To Close Grahams Ferry Road North of Villebois

A scheduled road construction project north of the Villebois neighborhood, at Tooze Road and Grahams Ferry Road, necessitates a road closure, resulting in detours and possible delays.

From May 31 until June 22, Grahams Ferry Road — between Tooze Road and Malloy Way — is closed to all traffic on weekdays. Through traffic is being detoured north on Tooze Road to Malloy Way.

Weekend traffic is allowed when the roadway is safe. Residents requiring local access are allowed passage to homes within the closure area, but delays should be expected.

Business License Renewals, Fees Due to City By June 30

Wilsonville's Business License renewal period occurs each June; all business licenses expire on June 30. To expedite renewals, the City mails renewal application forms to all currently licensed businesses starting the first week of June.

Renewing a business license is an easy three-step process:

1. Complete the information at the top of the form.
2. Calculate the amount due according to the fee schedule.
3. Insert the signed and dated form with the fee in the return envelope and mail back or place in the drop box at City Hall.

When the renewal application is processed, a new business license is issued and is mailed to the business for display.

A Few Simple Steps Can Decrease Chance of Getting Injured in a Fall

As people age, the consequences of a fall grow more serious.

Unintentional falls are the leading cause of injury deaths for adults ages 65 and older, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Falls are the most common cause of traumatic brain injuries and account for more than 95 percent of hip fractures. In addition, fractures from falls are a leading cause of disability and often result in entering a nursing home.

Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue crews responded to 5,624 reports of falls within its service area in 2017.

"Most falls happen in the home and can be avoided," said Cassandra Ulven, TVF&R's Public Affairs Chief. "Factors such as poor lighting, narrow stairs, and slippery surfaces can increase the chances of a fall. In addition, problems with glare, depth perception, tiredness or dizziness from prescription medications contribute to falls."

Research conducted by Yale University showed that older adults are also most at risk of falling when they fail to use handrails on stairs, reach for objects overhead, and climb on chairs or ladders.

TVF&R reminds seniors, and children of older adults, to take the following precautions:

Take Care of Yourself: Get regular medical check-ups and talk to your doctor to ensure appropriate levels and types of medication. Have your vision checked and replace eyeglasses as needed. Have your healthcare provider also check your feet to ensure you can walk comfortably. Exercise regularly to improve your balance and strength, and eat nutritious meals to fuel your body.

Remove Existing Hazards: Remove throw rugs or fasten them to the floor with double-backed tape to keep them from slipping. Keep cords out of pathways, and clean up spills as soon as they happen. Arrange furniture to minimize obstructions, and remove clutter. Fix loose or uneven steps. Make sure carpet is firmly attached to every step, or remove the carpet and attach non-slip rubber treads to the stairs. In the kitchen, keep items you use often in easy-to-reach cabinets.

Add Protection: Wear well-fitting shoes with good support and non-skid soles. Turn on lights when walking through dark rooms or hallways. Use nightlights in all rooms. Install grab bars in the bathtub, shower, and toilet areas, and add handrails on stairwells. Place phones in multiple rooms or keep a cellphone with you in case you need to call for emergency assistance.

POLICE CHIEF'S CORNER

Play it Safe When You're Out in the Water this Summer

Summer is just around the corner and, with it, the fun-in-the-sun and water activities.

For many years, I worked as a water rescue specialist. I know from experience that drowning is a preventable tragedy. We can do many things to make water activities — including boating, swimming, floating, and fishing — fun and safe.

One of the most common excuses I used to hear about people not wearing personal flotation devices (PFDs) was, "I'm a good swimmer!" Even good swimmers are overcome by injury, cold, exhaustion or fear. Wear it! Understand how to fit PFDs on yourself and on children properly.

Other water-safety tips from the National Institutes of Health include:

- Learn CPR.
- Never swim alone.
- Don't dive into water unless you're sure of the depth.
- Know your limits – don't over-exert yourself.
- Avoid drinking alcohol during water activities, including swimming, diving and boating. Do not drink while supervising children. The risk is high and the consequences can be lethal.
- Do not leave children unattended around water. This includes wading pools and bathtubs.
- Provide children with swim lessons.

Understand that attempting to rescue another swimmer in distress is very dangerous. Trained rescuers teach and use a protocol called "Talk, Reach, Throw, Row."

Talk: Call 911 – then see if you can coach the person to swim to you on shore or to a boat.

Reach: Try to reach to them by extending a pole,

branch, or inflatable boat. Do not allow them to grab hold of your body, as they may try to pull you in.

Throw: You can throw a distressed person a life jacket, life ring, rope or any other object that will help them stay afloat.

Row: If necessary, use a boat to get to the person.

Other important safety tips to remember:

- The water is colder than you think. Even in late spring, the water is still bone-chilling. Underestimating river swiftness and temperature has led to several tragic drownings on county waterways in recent years.
- Check river conditions before going out on Clackamas County rivers. If it seems like the water may be too treacherous, wait until later in the season when the waters have receded and warmed.
- Be knowledgeable of potential hazards, including deep and shallow areas, currents, depth changes, obstructions and also know where entry/exit points are located. If you aren't sure you're swimming in a safe place, DON'T SWIM.
- If you operate a power boat, be sure to get your Boater Education Card.
- All boats, no matter how big or small, need one wearable PFD for each person on board, anyone under the age of 12 has to wear it at all times while the boat is underway.

Reports from City Boards and Commissions

Council Approves Funding Source for “Boeckman Dip” Bridge, Approves New Waste and Recycling Agreement

At the May 7 meeting, the Wilsonville City Council approved on first reading an amendment to the Year 2000 Urban Renewal Plan that provides a funding source for the proposed “Boeckman Dip” bridge. This project would improve East to West connectivity, making Boeckman Road safer for all modes; cars, buses, emergency vehicles, pedestrians and cyclists – especially important with the new middle school and future elementary school located just off of Boeckman Road. The amendment increases the authority for spending in the urban renewal area by about \$14.5 million.

Council also approved, on first reading, a new solid waste franchise agreement with Republic Services, which provides garbage, recycling, yard debris, and other services to City residents and businesses. The City’s existing agreement with Republic Services has been in place since 1982. The new agreement, effective July 1, provides for smaller annual, inflation-indexed increases in rates (rather than periodic, and generally larger, rate increases) and adjusts the City’s franchise fee to 5%, commensurate with the fee paid by other service providers in other cities. A \$2.50 monthly recyclables surcharge for residential customers and \$1.50 per yard recyclables surcharge for commercial customers, effective July 1, are included in the agreement. A modest rate increase of 3.25% was also approved, effective July 1. This results in a \$0.86 increase in the service rate for most residential customers.

On second reading, Council approved the City’s 2017 Water Treatment Master Plan Update was approved. This update provides a 20-year plan to ensure reliable delivery of high-quality drinking water to Wilsonville citizens and businesses. The plan identifies

equipment repair and replacement schedules, details capital and operational improvements— including seismic upgrades—and accounts for facility expansions to accommodate future growth. The updated plan also coordinates the City’s plant improvements with several projects to be undertaken by the Willamette Water Supply Program as part of their plan to supply water to Hillsboro and Tualatin Valley communities.

Also approved, an amended contract with CH2M-Hill Engineers for the \$338,000 replacement of a 40-year-old outfall pipe at the Wilsonville Water Treatment Plant and a resolution authorizing the City to nominate the Frog Pond East and South Neighborhoods for inclusion in the Urban Growth Boundary. Metro is accepting city proposals until the end of this month and render growth management decisions by the end of 2018.

During Mayor’s Business, Council President Scott Starr read a proclamation declaring May 20-26 as National Public Works Day. Starr also noted, during Councilor Comments, that prospective City Council candidates may file for the November 6 election on May 30. Two four-year terms on the five-member Council expire on Dec. 31.

At the work session prior to Monday’s meeting, City staff discussed details of the draft Park & Recreation Master Plan and and public feedback on the Community Design Concept for the Wilsonville Town Center. John Williams, from the City of West Linn, provided an update from the Willamette Falls Locks Commission, which is seeking an operator to rehabilitate and reopen the locks.

City Council Adopts Water Treatment Master Plan Update, Approves Fishing Off of Memorial Park Boat Dock

During the April 16 meeting of the Wilsonville City Council, the Council adopted on first reading the 2017 Water Treatment Master Plan Update (see above).

The Council also adopted a resolution to allow year-round fishing from the Memorial Park boat dock. Last year, Oregon State Marine Board grant restrictions prohibiting fishing from the dock expired, allowing Council to consider the an option recommended by Parks and Recreation staff.

A contingency budget transfer to Personnel Services was approved, allowing the City to immediately seek a full-time City Engineer, a position currently occupied by the Community Development Director who is performing double duty. This new Community Development Department position will oversee the Engineering Division’s programs, including construction activity related to the Willamette Water Supply Program and other major municipal, capital improvement projects.

During Mayor’s Business, Mayor Knapp appointed Councilor Kristin Akervall to represent Council on the Wilsonville Metro Community Enhancement Committee. He also read a proclamation declaring May as Bike Month, encouraging residents to ride safely for fun and fitness.

During Communications, Wilsonville’s Chief of Police Robert Wurpes provided a review of police activity in Wilsonville during 2017. Chief Wurpes noted the department’s efforts to engage citizens on social media, including the April 24 Coffee With a Cop event.

Councilor Stevens provided an update from the meeting of the French Prairie Bridge Task Force, which unanimously recommended support of a preferred bridge location adjacent to the Portland and Western Railroad facility.

During the citizen input period, a representative of Wilsonville STAGE appealed to the Council for consideration of funding and the location of a new theater space for the company. A representative from Republic Services discussed changes in recycling costs and requirements, and how those measures may impact the company’s services.

The City Manager noted the passing of longtime Wilsonville Municipal Court Judge, J. Michael Gleeson, who served the City from 1988 until his retirement in 2017.

At the work session prior to Monday’s meeting, City staff and representatives from Greenplay, LLC, shared details of the draft Park & Recreation Master Plan, which is scheduled to be considered for Council adoption on June 4. The plan accounts for population growth, addresses service gaps, provides improved access to the Willamette River, increases connectivity and walkability, and recommends new amenities and/or facilities to expand programming. Staff also detailed draft components of an updated solid waste franchise agreement with Republic Services that is scheduled for public hearing by Council on May 7.

Candidates for City Council Seats May Now File; Deadline is Aug. 20

Two seats on the five-member Wilsonville City Council will be contested during the fall general election on Tuesday, Nov. 6. The four-year terms of Councilor Scott Starr and Councilor Charlotte Lehan expire on December 31.

All City Council positions are four-year terms, non-partisan and elected at-large. Qualified candidates must be registered voters living within Wilsonville city limits for 12 months prior to the Nov. 6 election.

Candidates may file with Wilsonville’s City Recorder, Kimberly Veliz, between May 30 and August 20. Interested applicants are encouraged to meet with the City Recorder to pick up a packet of materials that outline the election process.

Election guidelines require that each candidate submit a pre-approved petition that includes at least 20 signatures from registered voters residing within city limits. Additionally, candidates may need to submit a contribution and expenditure report to the Secretary of State.

All petition signatures must be verified by the City Recorder. Candidates are encouraged to obtain more than the required number to ensure that a sufficient number are valid. Signatures are invalid if a person is not a registered voter, has recently moved to the community and did not re-register, or lives outside the City limits.

The City’s Aug. 20 filing deadline ensures that the City Recorder has adequate time to verify signatures and provide candidates an opportunity to correct or obtain additional signatures before the State of Oregon’s Aug. 28 filing deadline.

Planning Commission Seeks Additional Input on Parks & Recreation Master Plan



At a legislative hearing to consider recommending adoption of the City’s Parks & Recreation Master Plan to City Council, the Planning Commission approved a motion to continue the hearing to August 8, keeping the record open for additional testimony.

The two-month stay provides City staff additional time to address questions presented by City Council during the May 7 work session and to consider public testimony introduced at the May 9 meeting.

The Parks and Recreation Master Plan provides a community-driven vision and long-range guide for Wilsonville’s parks, facilities and community programs. This update to the 2007 Parks and Recreation Master Plan addresses deficiencies, amends goals, and identifies needs for future park development, recreational services, trails, and open space preservation. Additionally, the plan prioritizes short-term and long-term needs and provides approximate costs of improvements and additions.

Informed by extensive community engagement with residents, business owners, and other stakeholders, the Parks and Recreation Master Plan is a collaboration between City staff and GreenPlay, LLC, a national consulting firm that specializes in facilitating, researching and developing park and recreation master plans.

Informed by engagement with community stakeholders at two workshops and via online survey, the Boones Ferry Park Master Plan draft was developed with GreenPlay, LLC, a Colorado-based firm with extensive experience researching and developing master plans for parks throughout the United States.

The plan's purpose is to advise City Council and Parks and Recreation staff how Boones Ferry Park currently functions, and to guide future park improvements. Recommendations in the draft plan would enhance the park with new active amenities and improve its access to the Willamette River.

Currently, the seven-acre park in Wilsonville's Old

Town neighborhood includes a playground, an open lawn area and a basketball court. The park is also home to the Tauchman House, a popular location for City-sponsored programs and private rentals.

The master plan guides development of four acres of forested waterfront property to the east, three undeveloped acres to the west (between the railroad tracks and Boones Ferry Road) and three forested acres to the north. It also accounts for the possible installation of the French Prairie Bridge, which would provide pedestrians and cyclists passage over the Willamette River.
