K-2 Book Adventures (grades K-2) on Thursday, October 10th from 3:30 – 4:15pm.

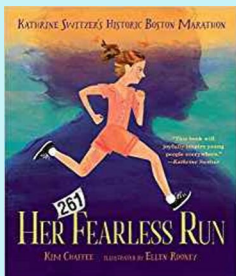
Enjoy fun presentations of new and classic kids' books...and then check them out!

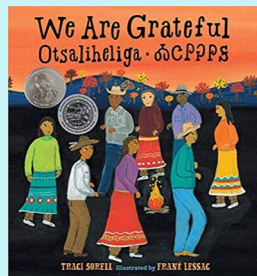

by Traci Sorell

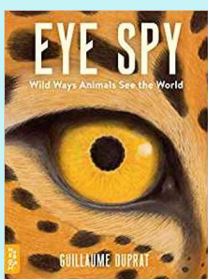

by Selina Alko

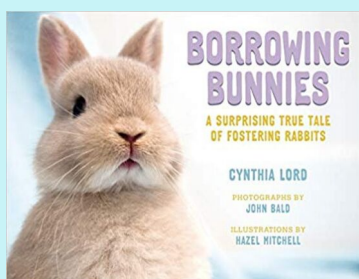

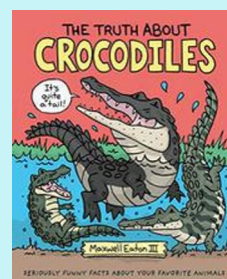
Eye Spy: Wild Ways Animals See the World

by Cynthia Lord

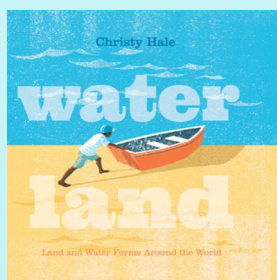

by Maxwell Eaton III

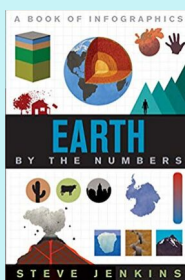

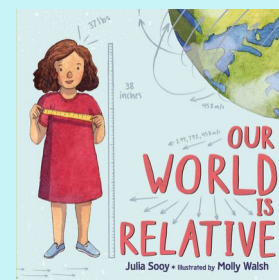
Water Land
